The Green Tape Measure (GTM) is a registered, volunteer-run North Carolina non-profit located in Raleigh. Founding

Originally founded in 2025 as an educational and training resource for interior designers, GTM expanded to its current mission and structure in 2026.

About the Study

Background

Interior designers and architects are both credentialed design professionals who shape the built environment and thus directly impact public safety.

Yet decades of legislative and regulatory history have resulted in a landscape in which architects frequently receive blanket exemptions from interior design regulation — often on the basis of assumed equivalency in training and competency.

At the time of this writing, all US State interior design bills include an exemption for architects.

Why Does it Matter

Two primary reasons exist for why blanket exemptions should be better supported with data:

- 1) **Public Safety:** The design of the interior environment directly impacts whether occupants can actually exit a space or building in an emergency.
- 2) **Market Share:** Logically, if architects can perform interior design work, what reason would clients or companies have for hiring an interior designer?

Exempting one profession from requirements placed on another devalues the work of the regulated profession while possibly exposing the public to unqualified designers.

Questions

This study seeks to answer the following questions:

- 1) Are Architecture and Interior Design distinct professions?
- 2) What overlap, if any, exists between the two professions?
- 3) Are the exemptions for architects in interior design regulations justified?

As documented in these pages the overlap is far less than is commonly assumed.

GTM's core research findings: Only 8% interior design coursework in top architecture programs. Only 25% overlap between ARE and NCIDQ exam content — representing approximately 31% of NCIDQ's actual design questions.

Who is this Analysis For

This comparative analysis was undertaken to provide an objective, data-anchored resource for three audiences:

The Public — individuals who hire interior designers or architects, or who interact with designed commercial and residential spaces, deserve to understand how each professional is trained and what their licensure examination actually tests.

Professional Associations — organizations representing architects, interior designers, engineers, and allied design professions benefit from accurate data when developing policy positions, making statements about scope of practice, or evaluating certification pathways.

Regulators and Legislators — state licensing boards, legislative committees, and public safety agencies that draft, amend, or enforce professional practice statutes need empirical evidence to evaluate whether existing regulatory structures protect the public — or simply protect market incumbents.

Methodology

GTM analyzed publicly available curriculum information from ten CIDA-accredited interior design bachelor's programs and ten NAAB-accredited professional architecture programs. We categorized each program's required coursework into six comparable subject categories (Fundamentals, Systems, Graphics & Technology, Professional Practice, and project-type studios), computed approximate credit hours per category, and calculated category percentages.

For examinations, we used published content outlines from CIDQ (for the 2025 NCIDQ exam series — IDFX, IDPX, and PRAC) and NCARB (for the 2025 ARE 5.0 — all six divisions). We mapped each exam section to a broad subject category, computed weighted time and question distributions, and identified sections with content that appears in both examinations.

All data is drawn directly from public sources. No data has been generated, estimated, or extrapolated beyond the methods described herein.

Important distinction: Task name similarity does not equal competency equivalency. Both exams may use the word "codes" or "project management," but the depth, context, and professional application tested in each differ significantly. GTM's analysis distinguishes what tasks are named versus what competencies are actually trained.

Section 1: Interior Design Education

1.1 About CIDA Accreditation

The Council for Interior Design Accreditation (CIDA) is the recognized accrediting body for interior design and interior architecture programs at the bachelor's and master's level in the United States and Canada. As of 2025, CIDA accredits approximately 170 programs globally¹. A CIDA-accredited degree is the standard educational pathway to NCIDQ examination eligibility and professional recognition.

CIDA accreditation standards address student learning outcomes across design fundamentals, human-centered design, technical knowledge, professional practice, communication, and global context. Programs must demonstrate that graduates are prepared for entry-level professional practice with a strong emphasis on health, safety, and welfare.

1.2 Schools Selected and Why

GTM selected ten CIDA-accredited interior design bachelor's programs in the United States for this analysis. Selection criteria included: institutional type diversity (public university, private university, specialty design school), program reputation, and publicly available curriculum documentation.









1.4 Curriculum Summary: Hours by Subject Category

The following table summarizes the approximate distribution of required hours across six subject categories for each of the ten schools reviewed. Hours correlate to credit hours. General education requirements (English, math, social sciences) are excluded unless directly related to Interior Design. Art History classes are also excluded unless explicitly required as major coursework (i.e. FSU). Otherwise, only design-discipline major requirements are included. Unless clearly noted, it is assumed that at least one studio course is devoted to residential design.

Below is a general description of what we included in each category. Please note that **there is overlap between categories**. Placement of a course in a particular category(ies) means that it mostly focused on that specific area based on the information provided in the course description at the time of this analysis.

Commercial: Covers studio projects of various sizes and complexity emphasizing evidence-based design, programming, HSW (health, safety, welfare), and codes & regulations for public spaces (i.e. workplaces, healthcare, and/or hospitality interiors)

Fundamentals: Includes building blocks of interior design such as elements & principles of design, color theory, interior design history, human factors and human behavior, spatial design, and the design process.

Graphics: These are courses focusing on drawing, technology, and presentation, such as graphic communications, software (CAD, SketchUp, Revit, Adobe CS), and presentation formats.

Professional Practice: Includes ethics, business administration, contract documents, internships, and employment preparation, such as NCIDQ exam practice.

Residential: These are studio projects focusing on inclusive and universal design approaches for children, older adults, and disabled individuals & programming and space planning for living environments.

Systems: Covers acoustics, codes and regulations, construction processes, daylighting, finishes, IAQ (indoor air quality), lighting, materials, MEP (mechanical, electrical, plumbing), site analysis, sustainability, textiles, and thermal comfort.

1.5 Average Distribution — Interior Design Education

Across the ten programs reviewed, the average interior design bachelor's program devotes approximately 81 hours of interior design coursework. The distribution of those hours across subject categories reflects the depth of interior-specific training:







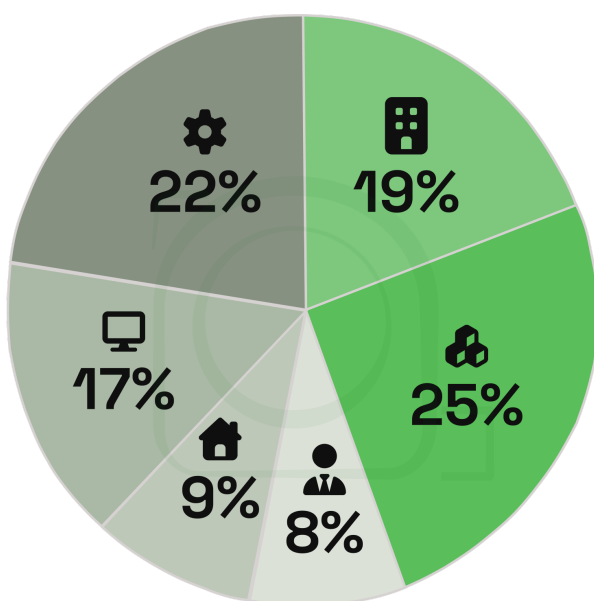

Interior design curricula are structured around the interior environment: how humans experience and inhabit space, what materials and systems govern that experience, and how designers plan, document, and execute projects **within building envelopes**. The largest portions of the curriculum are devoted to design fundamentals (25%) and building systems as they apply specifically to interiors (22%), followed by commercial studio projects (19%) and graphics/technology (17%).

Important context: Interior design programs do not train students in site design, structural engineering, civil engineering, urban planning, or exterior building envelope systems. These are intentionally outside the scope of interior design practice.

Section 2: Architecture Education

2.1 About NAAB Accreditation

The National Architectural Accrediting Board (NAAB) is the sole agency authorized to accredit professional degree programs in architecture in the United States. A NAAB-accredited degree (typically the B.Arch. or M.Arch.) is a prerequisite for architectural licensure in most U.S. jurisdictions. NAAB accreditation standards address student performance criteria across several areas including design, technical knowledge, professional practice, and leadership.²²

It is important to note that the B.Arch. is a professional degree requiring typically five years of full-time study, while many architecture programs also offer 4-year pre-professional B.S. or B.A. degrees that are not sufficient on their own for licensure. In order to make an accurate comparison with CIDA-accredited undergraduate degrees, GTM's analysis focuses only on NAAB-accredited undergraduate architecture programs.

2.2 Schools Selected and Why

GTM selected ten NAAB-accredited architecture bachelor's programs in the United States for this analysis. Selection criteria included: institutional type diversity (public university, private university, specialty design school), program reputation, and publicly available curriculum documentation.



2.4 Curriculum Summary: Hours by Subject Category

The following table summarizes the approximate distribution of required hours across six subject categories for each of the ten schools reviewed. Hours correlate to credit hours. General education requirements (English, math, social sciences) are excluded unless directly related to architecture. Art History classes are also excluded unless explicitly required as major coursework (i.e. PennState). Otherwise, only architecture coursework is included in this study.

Below is a general description of what we included in each category. Please note that **there is overlap between categories**. Placement of a course in a particular category means that it mostly focused on that specific area based on the information provided in the course catalogs at the time of this study.

Fundamentals: Covers design thinking, building-level spatial, environmental design theory, architectural theory, force and energy studies, and research methods.

Graphics: Focuses on drawing, drafting, software, modeling, and fabrication.

Interior Design: May include acoustics, codes & regulations, color theory, daylighting, heating/cooling strategies, human factors, indoor air quality, lighting, mechanical/electrical/plumbing systems, and thermal comfort. Course descriptions covering one or more of these topics are included in this category. **This category does not include professional practice or graphics/technology.**

Professional Practice: Covers networking, professional development, project management, construction administration, community engagement, and design roles.

Projects: Emphasize site & zoning restrictions, tectonics, landscape architecture, urban design, systems selection, building form and structure, building scale, thesis projects and research. Unlike interior design, we did not subdivide this category into residential and commercial projects. Descriptions provided in course catalogs were highly theoretical overviews.

Systems: Includes building construction assemblies, urban systems, architectural detailing, master planning, structures, building-level sustainability strategies, topography, landscape design, building envelope, site analysis, and vertical transportation.

2.5 Average Distribution — Architecture Education

Across the ten programs reviewed, the average accredited architecture professional degree devotes approximately **122 hours of major coursework**. Architecture programs are substantially larger than interior design programs, reflecting the broader scope of practice that includes site design, structural design and engineering coordination, exterior envelope systems, urban planning, and civil engineering integration.







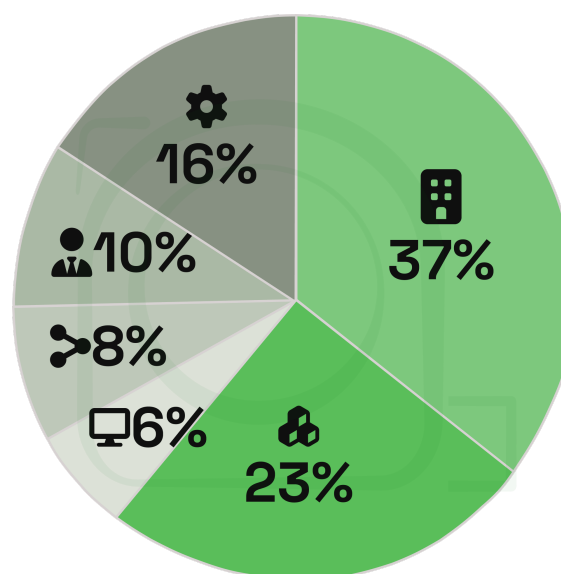

Architecture programs concentrate heavily on design projects and fundamentals. While Graphics & Technology only accounts for 6% of coursework, this is based on course descriptions only - it is highly likely that students gain additional knowledge of graphic representations in their studio projects, even if the studio descriptions did not indicate it.

Interior design content appears in all architecture programs but as a small fraction of the total curriculum. **We were generous with the interior design hours and included interior design overlap *anywhere* course descriptions noted or even implied interior design content.**

Section 3: Interior Design Examination (NCIDQ)

3.1 About the NCIDQ

The NCIDQ examination is administered by CIDQ (Council for Interior Design Qualification) and consists of three parts (as of 2025): the Interior Design Fundamentals Exam (IDFX), the Interior Design Professional Exam (IDPX), and the Practicum Exam (PRAC). Together, the three parts constitute the national standard for interior design licensure and certification in the United States and Canada.

The NCIDQ examination is grounded in regular practice analyses that assess the tasks, knowledge, and competencies required of entry-level interior designers. The examination emphasizes health, safety, and welfare — particularly as they relate to the interior environment, including egress, life safety codes, accessibility, building systems coordination, and material specification.

Candidates must have at least 60 interior design education credit hours or an architecture degree and complete a minimum number of hours of supervised professional experience before sitting for all three parts of the examination.⁴³

The total cost to take the exam one time (exam and application fees) is about \$1,375 plus \$605 if the candidate requires CIDQ's "Alternative Review Process". Pass rates vary by year and exam but are usually anywhere from 50% to 65%.⁴⁴

We evaluated the Exam PDFs CIDQ provided on their website and subdivided the content into 9 core areas: codes & regulations, project management, construction & building systems, programming, drawings, selections, professional business practices, human behavior, and sustainability.

3.2 Detailed Section Data by Exam Part

IDFX – Interior Design Fundamentals Exam⁴⁵

The IDFX focuses heavily on Health, Safety, and Welfare (HSW) and is structured for designers just entering the profession.

We subdivided three sections of this exam in order to evaluate HSW testing in more detail:

- **Materials & Finishes:** Based on the description provided, codes and standards constitute at least half of the content of this section.
- **FF&E & Lighting:** The description implies that about half of the questions are related to non-life-safety elements, and the remaining amount are split between codes and sustainability.
- **Drawings:** For this test, the description shows heavier emphasis on understanding the different sheets within a construction set than on building codes.

IDPX – Interior Design Professional Exam⁴⁶

The IDPX incorporates project management into many test questions in addition to building codes knowledge.

Percentages for each section reflect those in CIDQ's document with further subdivision as follows:

- **Project Assessment:** In addition to calculating square footages, there also appears to be equal weight on sustainability strategies and regulations, especially as related to accessibility and occupancy types.
- **FF&E Integration:** Questions are predominantly about managing projects but the provided description implies some testing on accessibility and building codes.

PRAC – Practicum Exam⁴⁷

The PRAC's primary purpose is to ensure interior designers can design to code and with respect for the humans that will occupy the spaces they design. There is heavy emphasis on HSW as it covers codes and regulations extensively. Typically, designers are provided with examples focused on contract environments (i.e. offices, multi-family).

We further subdivided the following sections of the exam:

- Programming, Planning, & Analysis: Though the majority of this is diagramming, there are some questions dedicated to accessibility and life safety. There is also some mention of human factors.
- Contract Documents: It is indicated in the provided description that a large portion of contract documents questions concern the creation of the drawings themselves. However, there is some additional testing in the area of codes and lighting selections.

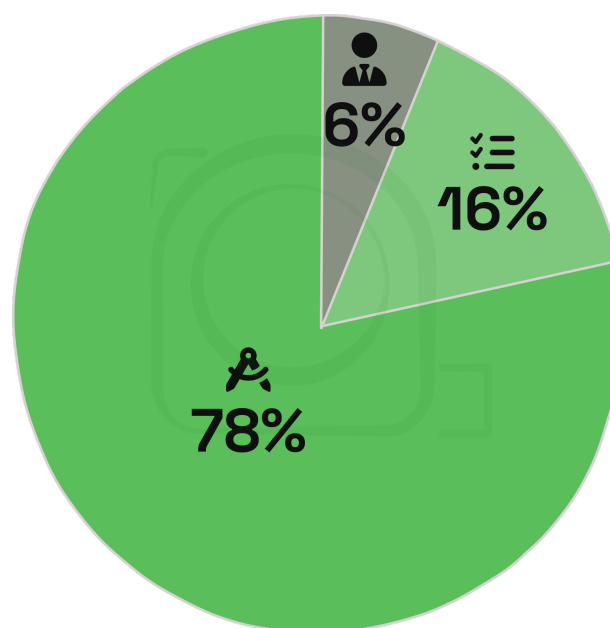

Section 4: Architecture Examination (ARE 5.0)

4.1 About the ARE

The Architect Registration Examination (ARE) is developed and administered by NCARB (National Council of Architectural Registration Boards) and is the national examination required for architectural licensure in all U.S. jurisdictions. ARE 5.0 consists of six divisions covering the full scope of architectural practice from business management through construction administration.⁴⁸

Most U.S. jurisdictions require an NAAB-accredited degree to take the ARE and obtain a license. However, NCARB is currently advocating for multiple pathways to licensure in order to relieve the financial burden many emerging architects face.⁴⁹

The total cost to take the exam one time (exam and application fees) is about \$1,500 plus a \$103 NCARB record fee. Pass rates vary by year and exam part but are usually anywhere from 50% to 65%.^{50 51}

We evaluated the Exam PDFs provided on NCARB's website and subdivided the content into 9 core areas: codes & regulations, project management, construction & building systems, programming, drawings, selections, professional business practices, human behavior, and sustainability.

This section focuses solely on the ethics and regulations related to operating an architecture practice. Therefore, we placed this section entirely under our Professional Business Practices category.⁵²

Given the title of this section and its focus entirely on the management of architectural projects, we placed this under our Project Management category. This exam covers risk and quality control, project scheduling, and the development of office standards and project teams.⁵³

Programming & Analysis (PA)

While both interior designers and architects conduct surveys and other programming activities, they each focus on different aspects of the project. Interior designers conduct surveys of the spaces their design will impact while architects research the entire building and site. Since spaces are within a building, there are logically some areas of overlap between the professions.

However, as the descriptions of each section of the exam reveal, this overlap is minimal and predominantly within analysis, building codes, and accessibility. Within programming, both professions conduct in-depth analysis and consider zoning limitations, areas lacking accessibility, and what codes are required for the jurisdiction. While interior designers do have some training in site analysis, architects conduct this in much greater depth due to its impact on the overall building.⁵⁴

Project Planning & Design (PPD)

This exam section tests candidates on their knowledge of the design of “sites and buildings.” While some overlap exists, the emphasis on the “building” and “site” references architecture. Per the descriptions, we estimated interiors overlap as follows:

- Codes & Regulations: NCIDQ tests on codes relevant to the design of *interior spaces*. While there will logically be some similar testing on the ARE, this section’s description emphasizes “site” and “building design.”
- Building Systems, Materials, & Assemblies: The “determination of systems” such as MEP, structural, conveying, and fire suppression, are not tested on the NCIDQ. However, “acoustics, communications, lighting, security” are clear areas of overlap. There is also logically some overlap in “materials and assemblies,” especially regarding interior non-loadbearing wall construction.
- Project Integration of Program & Systems: Areas such as “building configuration” and “environmental and contextual conditions” are architectural scope but there is some overlap in the integrations of systems and program requirements.⁵⁵

Project Development & Documentation (PDD)

In this section, candidates are tested on their knowledge of systems and their integration. This includes understanding what constitutes complete construction documentation, appropriate material selection, and construction methods. Both NCIDQ and ARE candidates are tested in these areas:

- Integration of Building Materials & Systems: Interior designers are not tested on the sizing of systems, but they do coordinate these systems and integrate strategies for acoustics, lighting, security, and communications. Conveying and fire suppression are areas in project design/development not tested on the NCIDQ.
- Construction Documentation: Change management, drawing coordination, and design documentation of the spaces are tested on the NCIDQ while items related to overall building and site design are not.
- Project Manual & Specifications: We estimate about 50% overlap here since both professions provide specifications but the content of those will differ.
- Codes & Regulations: Adherence to the IBC and other jurisdictional requirements is tested on both exams.⁵⁶

Construction & Evaluation (CE)

Construction administration (bidding/negotiation, construction observation, reviewing submittals, and similar) are tested on both exams. Logically in practice, the type of projects designers oversee will differ dramatically between interiors and overall buildings. Since design firms typically hire project managers for this task, we have placed this entire section under project management.⁵⁷

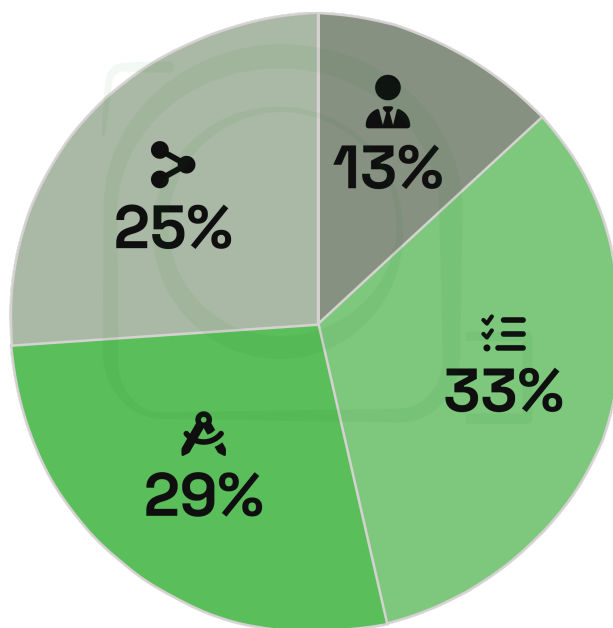

Section 5: Overlap Analysis

5.1 Overview: The Case for Distinction

The primary goal of this analysis was to determine whether interior design is truly distinct from architecture, and if their overlap warrants using architectural credentials in place of interior design licenses.

The data shows **interior design is a distinct profession** deserving regulation and employment opportunities that respect that distinction. In other words, **architecture credentials are not a substitute for interior design qualifications.**

5.2 Education Overlap

How We Measured

GTM compared the subject categories represented in both architecture and interior design curricula. Using course descriptions available on each program's website or course catalog, we identified coursework in architecture programs that mentioned project design, systems, or fundamentals subjects found in interior design programs. We excluded overlap in professional practice and graphics/technology.

While we support mandatory work experience, we cannot measure what a student actually gains in an internship (i.e. are they grabbing lunch/coffee or working directly on projects?). In regards to graphics/technology, subjects such as drawing, sketching, rendering, and software, while vital to being a designer, are also taught across other degree programs (i.e. art, engineering) and not directly related to public safety. Therefore, **we analyzed classroom instruction in areas of design unique to the curriculums of architecture and interior design.**

Summarizing the Data

The table on the next page shows a summary of overlap hours and percentages within each subject category. As stated previously in this report, **we were generous with this overlap and included any course whose description mentioned a topic found in interior design curriculums.**

As a reminder, not all degree programs included overlap in each area. For instance, only Boston Architectural College has a dedicated human factors course. The majority of overlap is found in systems-related courses, specifically those teaching construction materials and methods, heating/cooling strategies, acoustics, and life safety.

Key Findings

The data illustrates the key differences between CIDA and NAAB programs, highlights how universities categorize architecture and interior design, and indicates the relative rigor of each curriculum.

The following is unique to CIDA programs:

- Color theory
- Human behavior
- Human factors
- Interior design history
- NCIDQ exam practice
- Space planning
- Spatial design
- Studios dedicated to specific project types (i.e. workplace, healthcare, hospitality, residential)
- Textiles
- Universal design

The following is unique to NAAB curriculums:

- Building envelope design
- Building form, structure, and scale
- Building systems selection
- Force and energy studies
- Landscape architecture
- Master planning
- Structural design and engineering
- Tectonics
- Topography
- Urban design, planning, and systems
- Vertical transportation

This distinction between degree programs is also reflected in the distribution of degrees among universities. **Only 36% of universities with NAAB programs also have a CIDA accredited interior design program.** However, 12% of these schools do not have both programs under the same college or school. As demonstrated by the table on the next page, the universities included in our study reflect this segregation of interior design and architecture. In addition, the term “interior architecture” appears both within and separate from interior design, though CIDA remains the only organization accrediting interior architecture programs.^{58 59}

The data is not consistent but it may be worth further investigation if architecture and interior design students benefit from being in the same college.

A final key finding, detailed in the table on the next page, indicates that CIDA degrees may be more rigorous than NAAB degrees due to mandatory internships and competitive portfolio reviews.

5.3 Examination Overlap

How We Measured

GTM reviewed all published section descriptions for the NCIDQ (IDFX, IDPX, and PRAC) and the ARE 5.0 (all six divisions). We identified ARE sections or objectives where content explicitly appears in the NCIDQ content outline — including codes and regulations, building systems coordination, and programming. **We excluded Project Management and Professional Practice from this overlap and focused solely on where design knowledge is tested in both exams.**

Summarizing the Data

The table below shows a summary of overlap hours and percentages within each category. **Overlap may be overestimated as we made logical assumptions based on the information available.**

Key Findings

Interiors related design content on the ARE may include:

- Codes & regulations related to zoning, accessibility, egress, occupancy, and life safety
- Building analysis and programming
- Acoustics
- Lighting
- Interior materials and specifications
- MEP and structural coordination
- Construction documents change management, interior partitions, and what constitutes a complete set

It is important to contextualize the "125 questions" finding. The shared topics included in the list above are areas where both professions have a common interest in the safe delivery of built environment projects. But "shared topic" does not mean "equivalent competency."

For example: both exams address "codes." However, the NCIDQ tests codes as they apply specifically to interior spaces — finish flammability, interior egress, accessibility of fixtures and millwork, fire-rated interior partitions — while the ARE tests codes across the entire building and site, including exterior setbacks and structural load requirements.

Even more, our analysis shows that the **NCIDQ places substantially more weight on knowledge of codes and regulations** than the ARE, while the ARE tests about twice as much as the NCIDQ on project management and professional practice.

This means that despite there being overlap in code knowledge between the exams, we are only making an assumption that some of this overlap includes regulations related to interior spaces.

Other topics, such as programming and building systems coordination, carry similar weights in both exams.

Human Behavior, a vital part of interior design, is not explicitly stated as being tested on the ARE.

Overall, our analysis shows that **the ARE only covers 31% of the design content of the NCIDQ.**

5.4 What the Overlap Means

Education

The data presented demonstrates the following:

- Degree Distinction: A 10-hour (16.3%) course total does not equate to an entirely separate professional degree.
- Technical Rigor: Interior design and architecture degrees share equal technical complexity.
- MEP Systems: CIDA graduates are uniquely qualified to read, coordinate, and place mechanical, electrical, and plumbing systems.
- Codes & Regulations: Interior design programs deliver extensive training in life safety, accessibility, and building codes.
- Building Science: Interiors curriculums offer deep instruction in construction methods, sustainability, and acoustics.
- Human Factors: All studied interior design degrees mandate human behavior coursework, compared to only one architecture degree.
- Scale & Focus: Interior design optimizes the immediate human experience, whereas architecture focuses on overall building form.

Our report clearly demonstrates that an architecture degree is not a substitute for an interior design degree.

Examination

When compared to the NCIDQ, the ARE is lacking the following critical interior design elements:

- Human behavior
- Sufficient testing of codes and regulations (approximately 70% fewer questions than the NCIDQ)
- 70% overall less coverage of interior design topics

This data should not be a surprise. Architecture is a very broad field covering many aspects that do not appear at all in interior design, such as building enclosures, vertical transportation, structural design, and intensive site analysis. **An architectural license is simply not sufficient to also cover the knowledge required for an interior design credential.**

What We Advocate For Based on this Report

Balanced Paths to Licensure

- Flexible Multiple Pathways: Reward interior design degrees with reduced work experience.
- Alternative Routes: Allow non-degree candidates to qualify through additional training.

Fair and Equal Standards

- No Architect Exemptions: Require architects to meet identical interior design licensing standards to practice it.
- Distinct Hiring Practices: Recognize that architecture degrees do not substitute for interior design degrees.

Unrestricted Scope of Work

- Remove structural limits on interior designers regarding square footage, occupancy types, building systems, and egress.
- Permit independent, unlimited collaboration with other licensed professional disciplines.
- Trust designers to identify and hire specialized professionals (such as structural engineers) when needed.

Reciprocal Statutory Definitions

- Ensure legal definitions of architecture and interior design are mutually exclusive and clearly defined.
- Explicitly state in statutes that architecture does not encompass interior design if the reverse holds true.
- Either ban the use of "interior architect" and "interior architecture", or protect practitioners who have earned CIDA-accredited "interior architecture" degrees from being penalized or barred from using their preferred title by licensing boards.

The bottom line: An architecture license does not make a practitioner qualified to practice interior design any more than an interior design license makes a practitioner qualified to practice architecture. The two professions have distinct scopes, training, and competency requirements. Equitable regulation requires recognizing both.

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
